## Helpful tips for you and your family to stay safe online



Our children are extremely fortunate to be growing up in an exciting digital age with technology at their fingertips, with their use of laptops, smartphones, DSs, ipads, xbox and a host of other internet –enabled devices. At St James' we take all aspects of the children's safety very seriously and this includes teaching them to use the internet appropriately both at school and at home. We hope this leaflet helps you and your family to be guided safely through your use of internet.

## Our Acceptable Use Agreement for KS1

We only go online with a grown up

We are kind online.

We keep our information safe.

We tell a grown up if something online makes us unhappy.

## Our Acceptable Use Agreement for KS2

We ask permission before using the Internet.

We only use the Internet when an adult is in the room.

We only search for websites directly related to our schoolwork.

We tell an adult if we see anything we are uncomfortable with.

We only e-mail people an adult has approved.

We send e-mails that are polite and friendly.

We never give out personal information or passwords.

We never arrange to meet anyone we don't know.

We do not open e-mails sent by anyone we don't know.

We do not use Internet chat rooms at school.

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- **Safe searching settings:** make sure you set your internet providers safe search or parental functions to check that adult, inappropriate content is blocked although remember, no search engine is completely safe, family discussion and adult supervision are the best way to find out what is being accessed and whether it is suitable for your child.

- **Privacy settings:** review your settings regularly, on all search engines (Google, etc.) and social networking sites like Facebook. Are you clear what personal information, photos, etc. are being shared on the internet and can be viewed by total strangers? These settings are also applicable for ipads, smartphones, game consoles and any device that can access the internet. Youtube also has parental settings in order to block adult content.
